**NOTICE OF MOTIONS**

1. Ms M M Wenger moved: That the House debates the release of the so-called “spy-tapes” and the role it has played in defence of our state institutions and the constitutional principle of equality before the law.
2. Mr R T Olivier moved: That the House debates the state of learner transport in the Western Cape and the Department of Education’s role in ensuring the best possible service to learners.
3. Mr R B Lentit moved: That the House debates the first 100 days in the new term of government under the leadership of Premier Zille and her cabinet.
4. Mr S G Tyatyam moved: That the House discusses the South African Women’s Charter adopted 60 years ago and the strides achieved since its adoption, particularly in the Western Cape
5. Mr M Mnqasela moved: That the House debates the report by Stats SA on the provision of free basic services per province which shows that the Western Cape is the number one provider of services in all primary categories.
6. Ms P Z Lekker moved: That the House debates the increasing problem of intimidation by drug lords and gangsters to the level where parents are too scared to send their children to school.
7. Mr R B Lentit moved: That the House thank the Premier of the Western Cape and leader of the Democratic Alliance for defending and maintaining the Constitution of South Africa.

Ms S W Davids moved: That the House notes that the Cape Chamber of Commerce and Industry slammed the DA run City of Cape Town for the new tariff hikes on outside tables of the city's restaurants as unreasonable and unacceptable; and other role-players claiming it would lead to job losses and the reduction of tourist facilities.
9. Mr M Mnqasela moved: That the House congratulates the Democratic Alliance in the Western Cape for governing the province that provides the best basic services to its entire people.
10. Mr R T Olivier moved: That the House commends the National Department of Basic Education and Deputy Minister Enver Surty for their Accelerated Schools Infrastructure Delivery Initiative (ASIDI) programme for the upgrading of school facilities of which Die Duine Primary School in Lotus River is a prime example of the excellent service delivery under this national programme.
11. Ms D Gopie moved: That the House notes the persistent bad newspaper reports of poor service delivery or bad experiences at facilities of the Provincial Department of Health together with the fact that health workers now have to work under duress as they fear for their lives.
12. Mr K E Magaxa moved: That the House notes the reports indicate that the DA led City of Cape Town continuously tears down dwellings in informal settlements with their dreaded unit known as the land hit squad and leaves scores of people with children homeless.

Ms M N Gillion moved: That the House calls on the Western Cape provincial government to investigate, speed up the process and provide support to hundreds of struggling crèches in poor areas and to get the necessary certification in order to enable them to get state funding to continue with the good work of nurturing the poor workers children.
