42. Mr F Kamfer to ask Mr J J Londt Minister of Social Development:

In respect of food insecurity:

- (1) (a) What is the current estimated prevalence of food insecurity in the province, (b) how has this changed over the past five years, (c) what are the primary drivers of food insecurity in the province;
- (2) whether there are any seasonal fluctuations in food insecurity, particularly in rural and farming communities; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (3) what is the detailed breakdown of the number of households experiencing food insecurity in the province, including a demographic breakdown, including (a) race; (b) income levels, (c) number of households earning below the food poverty line, (d) employment status, (e) number of social grant dependency, (f) unemployed, (g) those employed in the informal sector?

Minister of Social Development to respond in a written reply:

The Department of Social Development uses the annual Statistics South Africa General Household Survey (GHS) to measure the prevalence and the trends in food security over time. The GHS is a sample survey conducted on an annual basis. Due to the sample size, it is only possible to determine the prevalence and trends at a Provincial level. In this response, the GHS of 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023 and 2024 have been used. The GHS of 2024 being the latest available data. All the data presented below is for the Western Cape.

(1)(a) What is the current estimated prevalence of food insecurity in the province

There are a number of questions on food security in the GHS 2024 questionnaire. This response focuses on five of the questions. All household responses to the GHS questions are self-reported and not assessed by the enumerator.

All household responses to the GHS questions are self-reported and not assessed by the enumerator.

The GHS does not provide any data on the drivers of food insecurity in the province.

(2) whether there are any seasonal fluctuations in food insecurity, particularly in rural and farming communities; if so, what are the relevant details;

The GHS is an annual survey and does not provide any data to measure seasonal fluctuations in food security.

(3) what is the detailed breakdown of the number of households experiencing food insecurity in the province, including a demographic breakdown, including There are a number of questions on food security in the GHS questionnaire. This response focuses on five of the questions cross-tabulated by demographic variables. The same questions are not necessarily asked each year, so some questions only have a three-year trend and not five years. The percentages do not all total up to 100% due to rounding and instances where some households did not respond to the question. All household responses to the GHS questions are self-reported and not assessed by the enumerator.
